FINAL PUBLIC NOTICE

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has received a subgrant application for the City of Coral Springs to make repairs to the Public Safety Complex due to storm damage from Hurricane Irma (DR-4337-FL-PW-05859). Pursuant to Executive Order 11988 and 44 CFR Part 9.12, final notice is hereby given of FEMA's intent to provide funding for this project under the Public Assistance (PA) Program.

An initial disaster-wide Public Notice was published October 6, 2017 for Hurricane Irma. Comments and other information received were fully evaluated by FEMA along with evaluation of social, economic, environmental, and safety considerations. This notice serves as a project-specific final notice for FEMA's funding action located within the floodplain.

Funding for the proposed project will be conditional upon compliance with all applicable federal, tribal, state and local laws, regulations, floodplain standards, permit requirements and conditions. This action complies with the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) requirements.

Proposed Work and Purpose: The City of Coral Springs is proposing to repair storm damage to the Public Safety Complex

including cleaning; drywall patching and painting of interior walls on three floors of the building; and pressure washing and applying Elastomeric Wall Coating for an exterior vertical wall as a result of Hurricane Irma. The purpose of the work is to restore the Complex to its pre-disaster condition, function, and capacity within the original footprint.

Project Alternatives: The alternative that has been considered is the no action alternative. The Public Safety

Complex is existing and was damaged primarily by wind. Not repairing the wind-damaged structure would seriously limit critical public safety functions within the City; and thus, the no action alternative is not considered to be a practicable alternative. Relocating the facility or abandoning its use is not a practicable alternative and would adversely impact

social or economic resources for the community.
